Advance Curricular Innovation and Deepen Experiential Learning

Every undergraduate student is guaranteed our experiential learning and living programs designed to develop skills and expand perspectives leading to successful careers of meaning and purpose. Experiential Journey Options

Available to all but not required of students, there are additional experiences designed into the academic calendar that allow faculty and staff to provide even more experiential, problem/project-based, community engaged, and global learning experiences for students. These include our global engagement courses and study away semester programs, our new Lightning Term courses over fall and spring break, and opportunities for students to complete on-campus and off-campus internships and apprenticeship semesters for credit.

Experience Leads to Career Pathways

We honor the value of all work. In doing so, we foster peer-to-peer engagement and team building, enhance student reflection, provide practical skills, and familiarize students with professional workplaces.

Warren Wilson is one of only nine federally designated work colleges in the country. All students hold jobs mentored by faculty and staff. Our students help to operate the College. In addition to supporting essential campus services, students have two more work-based experiences through work-integrated learning courses and leadership internships.

Ensure Access, Inclusion, and Student Success

Warren Wilson College aspires to be a place of radical inclusion. Forty percent of our students are Pell-eligible (from the lowest income brackets). More than half identify as LGBTQ+. Twenty-two percent of first-year students identify as first-generation college students and 20 percent identify as being of African/Black, Latiné, Indigenous, and Asian (ALIA) heritage.

We are dedicated to increasing access and will foster student success across the campus. We provide the tools and resources for graduates to collaborate and contribute to their communities and the nation.

Achieve Sustainability and Better Outcomes for All

Learning is every day, and education is life-long. *Our Progressive Promise* extends to Swannanoa, Asheville, and beyond through engagement with our community partners and programming through the Center for Working Lands, Mountain Institute for Lifelong Learning, Swannanoa Gathering, Farm School General Store, Chamber Music Series, public events, and more. We will pursue partnerships and programs to connect the College and region—strengthening both.

Coming Soon: Masters in Applied Climate Studies

The College will maximize its 1,100-acre, biodiversity-rich campus as an outdoor classroom with the launch of the Masters in Applied Climate Studies. This low-residency, applied program will explore climate change adaptation, mitigation, and response, and will integrate career-ready scientific and technical skills into the academic program. Three on-campus experiences will address real issues and research cases from around the world to complete team-based, collaborative, action-focused research with mentoring from industry professionals and scientific experts in the field. The program will welcome its first class in the Fall of 2025.
